What do city councils do?

City (and town) councils meet to consider important projects and operations for cities and towns. City councils also appoint people to important jobs like city manager and city attorney. City council meetings also provide a way for community members to have their voices heard.

Who is my city council member?

A city council is generally made up of five members from a local area, four as council members and one as mayor. In all cities and towns in Napa County, except for the City of Napa, council members are elected "at large." This means they can live anywhere in their community and still be elected. See the links below to learn more about the council in your city or town.

How has election to the Napa city council changed?

In 2020, the Napa City Council shifted to being elected by district for four seats, plus a mayor elected citywide. Instead of representing the whole City of Napa, council members represent specific districts. This way, each part of Napa has someone to represent their interests on the council while making citywide decisions. Districts 1 and 3 are up for election in 2022; the two incumbents are running again with no opposition. Districts 2 and 4 and the mayor will be up for election in 2024.
